If you are personally requested to attend, this is a compulsory intervention and attendance will be monitored.





This year the school has introduced the Duke of Edinburgh's Award to students. The award has already had a huge uptake and students are excited about the prospects it brings.

There are many students who have not experienced outdoor pursuits such as hiking, camping and learning how to navigate. Bringing this award to the school will enable students to enjoy aspects of outdoor life and see different parts of the country. By getting involved they will, over time, be able to visit Wales, the Lake District and the Peak District whilst learning about the different skills needed to go outdoors safely and the fun of being on a campsite.

The award includes different sections that students have to complete, one of which is volunteering. Depending on the level of the award, they have to undertake this for between 3-18 months. Many students have already contacted local schools, youth groups, care homes or charity shops within the local area where they will give up their time to support people and learn new skills within the community. Being a Catholic school our ethos includes assisting others and putting others before ourselves so being involved in the award enhances the students' understanding and empathy.

I believe people should vote for our project because this funding would allow the purchase of vital resources such as quality tents and camping equipment. This would reduce the cost of outdoor trips where, at present, equipment needs to be rented, and enable young people, who may otherwise struggle financially, to undertake training and experience the outdoors.

Hopefully our students will then be able to pass on the love and understanding of the outdoors of our big, truly fantastic country to future generations.
